He knows how you feel when you are tired and weary. Having been up all night being falsely accused and beaten, he was made to carry a part of his cross up to Calvary. The cumulative effect of physical and mental exhaustion reached a crescendo when he fell beneath the load. He knows.

He knows how you feel when you lose a loved one. Lazarus, his dear friend, died and in the shortest verse in the Bible his response is recorded – Jesus wept. He felt the pain of loss. When we consider that he knew that he was about to raise Lazarus from the dead even as he wept, I think it gives added beauty to the fellowship we have with him at such times. He knows.

Whatever it is that we face, we know that he faced it also. He was in all points tempted like as we are. He experienced to the full the human experience. He bids us come to him and find in him the foundation and motivation and strength we need to be the kind of people we should be. He knows – and he wants to help you. Will you come to him?
